A word from our Minister:

Most of you will know that February saw us move from the manse on Merrylee Road around the corner to a new manse on Muirhill Avenue – where I'm sitting writing this now.

One week on from "Move Date" I can say that it has been a good move for a whole variety of reasons. However, one unexpected benefit, has been it forced me to look at all the possessions that I have accumulated over the last 33 years and work out 'does this really need to come with me? Do I really need this?'

Whether it was clothes that no longer fit, DVDs that were no longer watched, books that were recommended at University, but have proved to be useless or furniture that was too big there were lots of things that I had that would be far more useful in someone else's hands than in mine.

Looking back, I have always struggled with the concept of travelling light. On weekends away I always took one set of clothes more than I ever needed. When it came to books or DVDs – I always wanted to complete the set, rather than be content with what I had. However, travelling with the right load is precisely what God calls us to do.

In Matthew 11:28-30 Jesus says 'Come to me, all who labour and are heavy laden and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light.'

On one side there are things we carry with us that we don't need to. For the people that Jesus was speaking to at that time it was the burden of having to fulfil the religious law that people had attempted to add to the law of God. For us, it could be our efforts to earn God's favour – which fail to hear his words 'It is by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God' (Ephesians 2:8); it could be the way

we carry around the guilt of our sin – and fail to hear his words 'If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness' (1 John 1:9); it could be our fear which cripples us and consumes our thoughts – and forgets that God says "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go.' (Joshua 1:9)

And the list goes on... But whatever it is we are carrying that we don't need to, Jesus remind us – 'You don't need to carry that. Give it to me.'

On the other there are things that we should carry with us that we don't. When it came to the house move, I had prepared piles to go to charity and was going back over them and found some things that I needed. Things that I definitely couldn't put out – including a book I refer to all the time. In the same way, in our search to divest ourselves of personal baggage that we don't need to carry, we cannot miss the fact that Jesus calls us to carry something – 'his yoke; his burden.' While Jesus calls us to give him all the useless things we don't need to bring with us – he gives to us the most useful thing of all time.

An invitation, a calling, to join him as he makes his Kingdom known in words and action and leads the world back to a relationship with God. There is no greater thing.

At the moment, in terms of the Christian calendar, we find ourselves in the middle of Lent – a period where traditionally the Church has given things up so that it can draw closer to God and refocus our love on our neighbours.

This Lent, I would invite you to join me as I come before the throne of grace in prayer asking Jesus 'What am I carrying that I don't need to?' and then giving it over to him. And then asking 'What would you like me to do?' and then asking his help to do it and then to get on and do it.

Memorial Corridor

Three new items have been added to the Memorial corridor.

The first is, The Boys Brigade 85th Glasgow Cathcart Company Roll of Honour 1894-1915.

Almost all of the names can be found on our former churches memorials, including the captain of the company Mr Roy C Maver who was killed in action in 1918.

The second item is, a photograph dated 1894/1895 showing the original members of the 1st Cathcart Company The Boy's Brigade.

These have been placed either side of the Boy's Brigade Memorial Window

The third item is the Roll of Honour for, The Cathcart Branch Glasgow Foundry Boys Religious Society. 'Here-on are written the names of the monitors of the Society who went out to serve their country in the great war beginning 1914.'

Almost all the names appear on both our former churches memorials including
Alexander C Kelly who was killed in action 1915 and Grace Etherington a nurse.

'In September 1894 another new organisation made its appearance- the 1st Cathcart Company of the Boy's Brigade. About the same time the Cathcart Branch of the Foundry Boy's Association came into our fold, by affiliation, as this branch had existed before the congregation was formed.'

The First Hundred Years 1887-1987

The Glasgow Foundry Boys Religious Society, instituted in November 1865 evolved from the response of a young woman, Mary Anne Clough, who was concerned about the welfare of young boys in local iron foundries in Glasgow.

Most of the boys could not read or write and Mary got permission to use an office in a foundry in the evenings in order to educate the boys. These boys aged 10 years upwards, worked 12 hour shifts then came to learn.

From an office in a foundry to a hall in Grove street (near St Georges Cross) the work developed.

Four Christian businessmen were responsible for the establishment of The Glasgow Foundry Boys Religious Society, an organisation that resulted in many branches being formed, in Glasgow, the Central belt of Scotland and elsewhere.

The organisation originally for boys, soon catered for girls and as they grew older their attachments to missions and churches became their place of worship. The four main areas of operation covered education, religion, social welfare and provident, matters. Central to the effort has always been the focus of leading people, young and old, to Christ.

Shining Hospitals

Pat O'Hanlon and Ruth Watson were among the first missionaries to arrive in Pokhara, Nepal in 1952. They wanted to offer medical help immediately and so erected small buildings made of bamboo and thatch. However, it wasn't long till a storm blew the roof off.

They found an Indian firm that made prefabricated aluminium huts. They bought two, and the shiny material, which could be seen for miles from the surrounding hills, created great interest. Soon people were turning up to see for themselves what these 'shining houses' were. And the nickname stuck – 'The Shining Hospital' and is used even by the Government.

Over the years the hospital grew and developed, treating all sorts of illnesses, with TB being the major one, so much so that a special TB unit had to be opened. As more and more patients with leprosy came for treatment, a new hospital was opened - Green Pastures, which has treated thousands of patients, earning a reputation for delivering quality care to the poorest and most marginalised people.

Today, it is the biggest rehabilitation centre in Western Nepal, expecting to serve around twenty thousand patients in 2018. People come seeking help for leprosy, spinal cord injury, general disability, cerebral palsy, hearing loss, and palliative care, a new concept in Nepal, where INF (International Nepal Fellowship) is leading the way. Green Pastures is one of only three leprosy referral hospitals in Nepal, the only spinal cord injury hospital outside the capital and the only centre in the western half of the country for prosthetics work. Medical services have recently expanded, with clinics in Banke on the Indian border and Surkhet in the hills; so from one Shining Hospital 60 years ago, INF has expanded to three Shining Hospitals.

The three centres have been officially registered under the name 'Shining Hospitals' and their vision is to be a leading example of medical care, setting new standards in Nepal's health sector. The leadership team are very clear; they want Christ to be at the centre. Medical Director Dr Dipak says 'Patients should get the best treatment that resources allow - clean wards, kind nurses, kind doctors. We want to give them a complete treatment and be able to share God's love.'

An additional problem in a country with the cultural and religious beliefs held by many Nepalis, is that diseases and disabilities are regarded as a curse which people have because they deserve them, and so the sufferers are often excluded from society, sometimes abandoned even by their family. When someone is cured of leprosy it may be impossible for him or her to return to his or her village. This means that in the Shining Hospitals the aim is not just rehabilitation, but to restore a damaged self-image and give a sense of hope and confidence and an awareness of the God who loves them.



A good example would be Purna, a man in his 30s with a wife and one child who was shocked to discover he had leprosy, and quickly came to Green Pastures for treatment.

Because it had been caught early, he was soon cured, but knew he would not be welcome back in his village where no-one would employ him.

There happened to be a vacancy for a garden supervisor at Green Pastures Farm.

Purna applied, was accepted and is now responsible for growing vegetables to supply the hospital plus a surplus to sell to the public.

Two or three Sundays ago when we sang in church" Shine Jesus shine, fill this land with the Father's glory," I thought of how, in Nepal, the Shining Hospitals are helping to fulfil that vision.
