LETTER FROM OUR MINISTER

Dear Friends

On Friday I received this message:

“Are you here to put out the last lights in this dying Church of Scotland, or are you fired up about what, in His grace, God is planning to do in local communities through you?”

I wasn't in the original audience (the question was posed to a group of trainee ministers). However, I want to suggest that it's a question that all current ministers and members of the Church of Scotland need to grapple with.

For decades commentators outside the Church, and analysts within, have been writing the obituary of the denomination. They have been pencilling in the date when there will be no more members of the Church of Scotland. For context, over recent years, the membership of the Church of Scotland has reduced by the size of a village every year. During 2019 (the most recent year I could find numbers for) over 13,000 more members died or left the Church of Scotland, than joined the Church.

You may also have heard that at this year's General Assembly of the Church of Scotland plans were put in place to reduce the number of full time equivalent ministries by around 40% to 600 across the denomination over the next 5 years.

So what can we do about it?

In summer 2006 I found myself sitting in Brazil staring at the statistics that showed the decrease in church membership in the Presbytery of Edinburgh. I was there with a Brazilian missionary who was at home in Brazil on furlough. Edinburgh was their mission field – it was mine too...

One of the reasons I had justified going to Brazil for the whole summer was that it would allow me to test whether I should be 'doing mission'. While I was there, God told me – 'Yes' and then showed me the mission field on my doorstep. Fifteen years later, I am ashamed that I had to go halfway around the world to really see that.

Matthew 9:37b - 38

"The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field."

Fifteen years on, and after even further decline in the number of members in the Church of Scotland, I remain convinced that God has not given up on Scotland. I am convinced that God is working in Scotland. That God loves the people of Scotland. That God wants the people of Scotland to know Him. And that God has laid a call on all of us, as His Church, His workers, to share these truths and many others with our community and beyond.

We live in a world, a country, a city, a community that is crying out for the transforming power of the Holy Spirit; that needs to embrace the love of God the Father and the forgiveness and new life that is found through our Lord Jesus Christ's redemptive life, death and resurrection.

Are we sharing this? Are we living it? Are we praying? Are we going out into the world and seeking to proclaim the gospel to the people out there? We can't rely on people coming to us (although some people do) – in general we need to go to where people are and share Jesus there.

As a Kirk Session, and with our Ministry Team leaders, we have been considering what God is calling us to do particularly at this time as the world re-opens and what structures we should put in place to facilitate these. (Please pray for us in this endeavour and look out for more information.)

As we've done this, we've been drawn back to the basics of our Mission Statement:

Following Jesus Christ
Glorifying God
Serving Others

I would encourage each of you to consider: Do discipleship, worship of God and service run through our lives individually and as a church family?

Each of these is a core element of what it means to live a life of faith. They're not just opt-in qualities for some of us; they're for all of us as we live for God.

As we open up as lockdown restrictions ease and we re-open church activities again, let's 'Build Back Better'. (I may have borrowed that slogan that from the UK Government.) Let's re-commit to working through the building blocks God laid on our hearts when we engaged in the vision process

Building Faith
Building Family
Building Prayer

as we Follow Jesus, Glorify God and Serve Others.

Let's build as God wants us to in this new era for His Church. God is still at work; God is still building His church. Are we at work with Him? Are we building alongside Him?

Hello from Cara at Cathcart Youth Ministry Partnership!

A big **thank you** for your ongoing support and encouragement of CYMP especially during the five-week Summer Programme.

With changing COVID-19 guidelines and restrictions nearly all of the CYMP Summer Programme was planned for outside and we were **amazed** we only had to use our wet weather option on the last afternoon of the Summer Programme which added to the excitement of **Fab Friyay!**

The Summer Programme kicked off with me leading a **Scripture Union holiday: LM1**. We ran two online events and two-day camps at Lendrick Muir. Incredibly thankful for the fantastic weather, a brilliant team and exceptional young people and some young people who attended are involved at a CYMP partnership church. Very thankful we were able to offer both online and face to face which meant that those young people who had to self-isolate were able to be involved online.



For five Mondays we were able to run our first ever **Toddler Holiday Club** in the Kent Hall of Cathcart Trinity. Those five weeks were wonderful and a big thanks to everyone involved. *Baby Sensory Glasgow South* created a bespoke package for us that linked with **the Jungle Adventure Holiday Club** teaching. Every week was incredible and it was amazing to see the delight on the children's faces.

Our clue words for **Jungle Adventure Holiday Club** were:

1. Follow
2. Listen and Obey
3. Even the Wind and Waves Obey Him
4. Loaves and Fishes
5. Friendship

Tuesday evenings we hosted **Youth Café** in the grounds of Cathcart Baptist Church. Thank you to the young people who attended and due to the incredible weather, we were able to have our first ever Slip and Slide! Each week at Youth Café we looked at the Bible story of Joseph and the Triumph of Grace.

Wednesday afternoons we were at the Pro-Soccer pitches at Rouken Glen Park for **Lightspeed: Sports**. Thanks to our coaches Craig, Aaron and Stephen for their continued enthusiasm even in the incredible heat.

We ran **Creative Sessions** on Thursdays and there was a huge variety of activities from decoupage, friendship bracelets, pallet furniture making, creating your own pet rocks and pom-pom making. The sessions created an opportunity for all ages to be creative together.



Friday, we ran **Jungle Adventure Holiday Club** in the grounds of Cathcart Baptist. Due to number of restrictions, we ran the same programme in the morning and then again in the afternoon. Adaptability has been a key word for the past 18 months and I am very thankful to our volunteers and young people who adapted to holiday club and embraced all that we were able to do outside.

Whilst the **Jungle Adventure Holiday Club** was on, just round the corner in the gardens of Cathcart United Free Church, an exceptional team hosted the **Jungle Java Café**. Refreshments and individually wrapped home baking was available along with good conversation. For the first time this year the café offered a prayer space which will lead well into a new initiative called Renew/Wellbeing which will start this September 2021.

We also gathered with young people at Auldhouse Community Church for **Magnitude**, a hybrid youth festival. Magnitude included evening gatherings, challenges, worship and time to respond to God. This was a special time of being together, eating together, worshipping together and learning more about God together.

Our last event of the CYMP Summer Programme was a **Kahoot! Quiz** won by Team Watson. It was a great way to end the programme as it was all ages having fun together and enjoying each other's company and taking it in turn to sit on the newly built pallet furniture.

As I reflect upon the Summer Programme, I am **incredibly thankful**. Thankful for the creativity and the variety of activities we were able to offer. Thankful for the volunteer team that adapted to using the outside spaces. Thankful for the large and small grants we received to fund this Summer's programme. Thankful to everyone who attended the Summer Programme – our youngest person was 18 months old.

A key Bible verse for me this summer was Romans 10: 15 **“How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!”** Sharing the good news of Jesus Christ outside this summer not only impacted those who attended but also those in our community. It

has been so encouraging to hear good news stories because of what was happening outside the church buildings.

We are looking forward to the **new academic year** and thank you for your continued prayers and support as we enter into a new term.

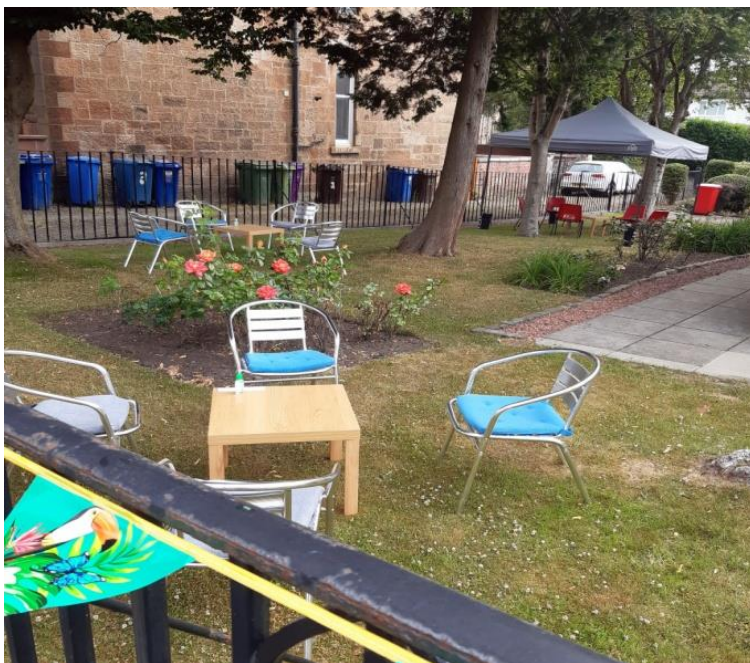
café has always been a place of interaction and it has been our prayer that many of these conversations have met people's needs at a deeper level.

In Paul's letter to the Philippians, he writes "***Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.***"

Throughout lockdown we have continued with Saturday morning prayer breakfasts – without the breakfasts! We have met on Zoom and have been able to pray together in small groups in just the same way as we would have when we were meeting physically. WIDER WORLD MISSION

Discipleship: deepening the roots of our faith

“Go and make disciples” is Christ’s final command to the Church.



Christians face the twin challenges of making disciples of ourselves, and making disciples of others. Discipleship with its twin priorities is perhaps the most pressing challenge that faces the Church.

Discipleship is vital for new Christians, turning an encounter with Christ into a walk with Christ, learning to walk alongside others in Christian communities. Discipleship is equally important among people with a long Christian heritage or who grew up in Christian homes. Much is lost unless each new generation meets and follows Christ for itself.

Pray for all disciple-makers around the world – all those who explain and apply the Bible week by week; those who teach the children; the youth workers who lead and mentor young people.

Pray for all those who train the disciple-makers of the future. Some of this is done formally in thousands of training institutes. Some is done informally through mentoring. Pray for a training ethos to spread through the Church.

Pray for the songwriters, musicians and worship leaders who set truth to music, and who can give voice to our voiceless prayers, enabling the word to ‘dwell richly among us’ (Colossians 3:16).

Pray the great prayers of the Bible for ourselves and the whole Church – that we would grow in our understanding of God, our grasp of his love, our unity, our perceptiveness and fruitfulness in his service.

Discipleship is the most pressing challenge that faces the Church.

ASIA

Asia is home to 60% of the world population across 48 countries. It is also a mosaic of 5000 ethnolinguistic peoples. These peoples can be clustered into a dozen blocs of related groups, including:

South Asian peoples (37% of Asia's population): mostly in India, Pakistan and Bangladesh. The Church is growing among the poor, less so among the rest.

East Asian (36%): In South Korea the Church is a large part of society; in North Korea, a hunted minority; in Japan a respected few; in China a fast-growing new reality.

Malay (8%) These well-travelled peoples have welcomed the gospel in the Philippines and in some parts of Indonesia. Christians are much fewer in Malaysia, and many parts of Indonesia still have few Christians.

South East Asia (5.4%): In Vietnam, Thailand, Cambodia, Myanmar and Laos, only a few of these Buddhist peoples have enjoyed significant movements to Christ, though Vietnam has a rapidly growing Church.

Turkic (3.7%): These Muslim peoples of Central Asia enjoyed a burst of church growth after the fall of Communism. Now it is harder.

Iranian-Median (3.6%): Very few of these people in Iran, Pakistan, Azerbaijan, Syria and Turkey are Christians, though the Church is growing fast in Iran. Satellite TV and the internet are helping take the gospel beyond closed borders.

Arab World (2.8%): The ancient churches are declining, often through emigration. But a new (and still much smaller) Church is emerging as people turn to Christ from a Muslim background.

Tibetan/Himalayan (2.3%): Some peoples in NE India, W China and Nepal have turned to Christ. Most have not, including Burmese and Tibetan peoples.

Asia's Christians were 1.8% of the world population in 1900 and 5.2% in 2018.

Pray that there will be many more turnings to Christ in Asia - on a scale and depth that will amaze us!

Pray for perseverance in this work in the face of opposition

Please pray for "Jamie", who just loves hearing everything she hears about Jesus, and has asked to hear a new story every day. Pray for "Mary," who has become a dear friend. Praise God for her openness to the stories she hears, her enjoyment of all the team, and her critique of her own culture. Pray for "Faith," a young woman who considers us her family, and attends our weekly worship and Bible study times.

Please pray that the Holy Spirit would convict each one, and the thousands of other North Africans, of their sinfulness and the truth of

the Gospel. Please pray for our part of the town, with drugs, prostitution, domestic abuse and an increasing sense of insecurity in the streets. Please pray that many would find their hope and freedom in Christ. Pray that believers would become united in prayer for their city, and many would be drawn here to be salt and light. Pray for the Holy Spirit to guide us as we consider the year ahead, and for our fruit to come from remaining in the Vine.

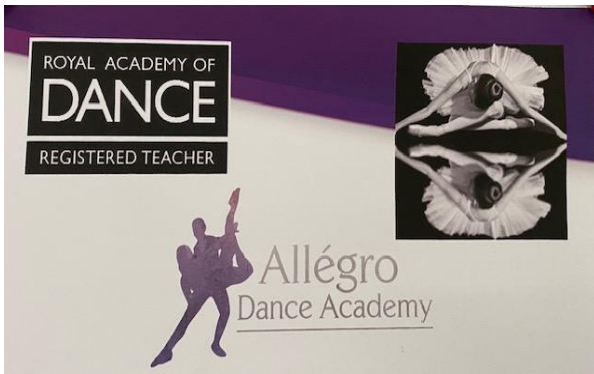


The second new group is Hear My Music.

Hear My Music believe that music is a powerful tool that breaks down barriers for vulnerable people. For people who find language, communication and social interaction a challenge, using music can offer the opportunity to be heard and to find a place in society.

Allégro Dance Academy has branches in various locations in Milngavie, Bearsden and South Glasgow, where the aim is to enable each student to achieve their full dance potential in a nurturing and caring environment. Students also learn self discipline and social skills.
