A word from our Minister:

'Is it too early to mention Christmas?' It's certainly one of the questions going through my mind as I sit at the end of October writing the minister's winter letter. However, on reflection it's a strange question to ask. I have never found myself thinking 'Is it too early to talk about Easter?' In fact, on Sunday I had no hesitation in talking and singing about the cross of Jesus and Easter is 6 months away. Why does Christmas feel different?

The best attempt at a Biblical answer that I can give is perhaps that the Bible (in terms of Old Testament foreshadowing, prophetic writings, gospel accounts and letters to churches) spends far more time talking about the sufferings, death and resurrection of the Messiah/Christ than his birth. This is certainly true. Yet, none of these other events would be possible without his birth.

Moreover, the fact that it is mentioned less does not make the Virgin Birth or God coming in human flesh to this world as a baby any less of a miracle, does it?

Leaving the Bible, other answers come to mind, but if I'm being honest – all that I could say could simply be dismissed as being simply cultural or experiential. Or perhaps as a knee jerk reaction to what the world has done to Christmas in terms of consumerism, overindulgence and joylessness rather than providing a real reason for not mentioning the Christmas of the Bible any other time than the period we can Advent.

So is it too early to stop and think about Christmas? I find myself convinced no, it's not too early.

If we believe that God was at work in the first Christmas and is at work through the story today, like Easter, Christmas is for the whole year.

As we remember the incredible gift of himself that God gives; as we ponder the miracle of God as one of us; as we walk each day aware of Immanuel – God with us and as we trust in the God who is the proven promise keeper – Christmas is not just for the 25th December or the couple of weeks before it. Christmas is for whenever we need it – and that's probably (definitely) all the time.

Prayer

When I was asked to write something for the newsletter titled: What is the importance of prayer in your life? I didn't know where to begin.

How could I possibly convey this in such a short amount of space?

Then I realised – I start with a prayer.

As I prayed I could recall countless examples of times when I had seen answered prayer in my life, cried out to God in prayer for help, or poured out my thankfulness to him.

In my life I have experienced joys and sorrows, but I know that I would not have been able to make it through any of this without prayer. Prayer to me, is as essential as breathing. Without it I would not be able to deal with what life throws at me.

Now, in saying this, I can in no way claim to have a perfect prayer life!

I often struggle in turning things over to God, or forget to say thank you when he answers a prayer. Sometimes I know I should be praying, but I just can't find the words I need to say.

It is in these moments that I am thankful for the words in Romans 8: 'In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans. And he who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for God's people in accordance with the will of God' (Romans 8: 26-27).

This verse has encouraged me a lot in times when I have not been able to put into words what I need to pray. God already knows.

The most important thing to me about prayer is that it is an everyday, all the time, thing.

I was once given a piece of advice that stuck with me, and that I try (my very best!) to keep to. 'Every day when you wake up say: Lord be with me through this day. And every day before you go to sleep say: Lord, thank you for being with me today.'

I find that every time I pray this prayer it is different: it may be that I need God's help to get through the day, or it may be I am asking for opportunities to serve him. I may be thanking Him for helping me to get through the day, or I may be thanking him for giving me the courage to take the opportunities He provided.

Any way allows me to show my dependence on Him for the day ahead, and my thanks for the day that has past.

In all situations, the most important way I can pray is to be thankful to God.

I aim to be thankful to God in everything, praying to him in times of sorrow, and times of joy, knowing that he is always listening, always knowing, and always loving.

'Rejoice in the Lord always, I will say it again, Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus.' Philippians 4: 4-7.

What shape is your church results

I would like to extend my deepest thanks to everyone who responded to the "What shape is your church?" questionnaire. We received 55 unique responses and while understandably there were a wide variety of different responses to some questions (which will be interesting to explore in more depth at a later date) the averaged results make interesting reading and give some indications of how folk currently feel about our ministry as Cathcart Trinity Church.

The Presbytery asked us to use the following categories:

Not considered/discounted 0

We have started thinking about this 1

Needing review or just getting started 2

Actively working and developing this area 3

Strong work in this area/seeing healthy developments 4

A core part of our culture 5

A number of those who responded noted that 'Needing review' and 'Just getting started' are not synonyms so it might have been helpful to have these as separate categories. The results are below. The number in the square brackets is the ranking and the number after the statement the average congregational response to each statement.

[2] Where the sacraments of baptism and communion are celebrated – 4.7

[3] Where the Good News of the Kingdom is proclaimed – 4.6

Around 4

[4] Where grace, love and unity are shown, where people are encouraged, gifts are developed and shared – 4.1

[5] Where hospitality is offered – 4.0

[6] Where people are enabled to journey in faith and grow in wholeness – 3.9

[7] Where there is a response to human need by loving service – 3.8

[8] Where new believers are taught, baptised and nurtured – 3.8

[9] Where local relationships – parish neighbours and ecumenical groups are nurtured – 3.8

Between 3 and 4

[10] Where ministries of service and leadership are developed – 3.6

[11] Where people grow as disciples – 3.5

[12] Where there is inclusion and participation - barriers are removed to allow the involvement of worshippers – 3.5

[13] Where churches engage with and mutually support each other as part of Presbytery - 3.3

Around 3

[14] Where there is relevance to the people of the parish – 3.2

[15] Where structures are ordered and organised in a way that supports mission and good practice – 3.2

[16] Where the church engages with the Church of Scotland, its Councils and Committees – 3.2

[17] Where our relationship with the Church past, present and future is recognised and celebrated – 3.1

[18] Where the church identifies and connects with the worldwide church – 3.0

[19] Where the church strives to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth – 2.9

[20] Where unjust structures of society are transformed, violence of every kind is challenged and peace and reconciliation are pursued – 2.9

These ranking and responses will be useful to the Kirk Session as we continue to look at our future direction. If you would like any more information or to talk about any aspect of the questionnaire or its results, please don't hesitate to contact me.

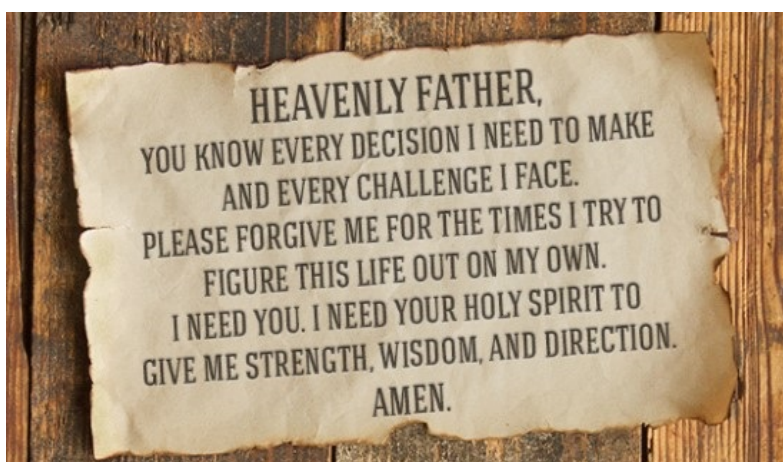

New Cathcart UF Church

In August 1914, the country was plunged into war. Immediately men from the congregation began to leave for service in the Army and the Navy, and the life of the Church, in common with the life of the nation suffered severe dislocation.

In view of the enforced dimming of the lights, the evening service for a time was changed to afternoon and the various organisations had to adapt themselves to the exigencies of the situation. These four years were a time of great stress and great anxiety for many of our people.

The Minister and people set themselves to keep in touch with those who were serving and there was great activity in the then Ladies Guild.

Casualty lists were very heavy and it was not long before people in the congregation had their anxiety turned into sorrow as one home after another lost a dear one in the fighting line.

In the end, fourteen men from New Cathcart Church made the supreme sacrifice. Their names appear in the first Roll of Honour.

At length the seemingly interminable strife ended when an Armistice was signed on 11th November 1918.

Gradually those on service began to return. On 8th January 1920, the congregation entertained the returned soldiers in the Couper Institute.

Mr Pearson presided and in words of warmth and sincerity thanked the men and made them feel the reality of the welcome extended to them.

Lt. Col. Galbraith TD JP on behalf of the servicemen, thanked the minister and congregation.

On Sunday 15th February 1920 a Service of Commemoration was held in the Church and a Memorial Window to the fallen was unveiled. Mr Pearson conducted the service, the Lessons were read by Lt. Col. Galbraith and Mrs Pearson unveiled the Window.

With the War over and the Service people returned, the congregation resumed its normal activities, and a good deal of thought and action was given to ways and means of making religion a more vital force in the lives of the people and especially of the young. This was a matter that engaged the thoughts and energies of the Church all over the land at this time.

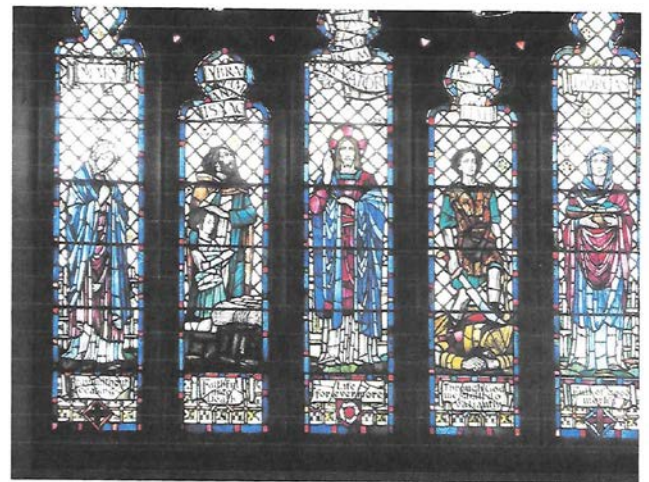

Seventy- five Years in New Cathcart Church

Thanks be to God
which giveth us the victory



The stained glass window above the organ was on 8th February 1920, dedicated to the glory of God and in grateful acknowledgement of the services rendered by the men and women of this congregation during the Great war 1914-1919 and especially of the 27 young men who died on service.

The window was designed by R. Anning Bell, ARA, RSW, RBC, and contains five lights.

In the first, is Mary the mother of Jesus, with the words

"Pray without ceasing" ;

In the second, Abraham ready to sacrifice Issac,

"Faithful unto Death" ;

In the centre, Christ, "Life for evermore" ;

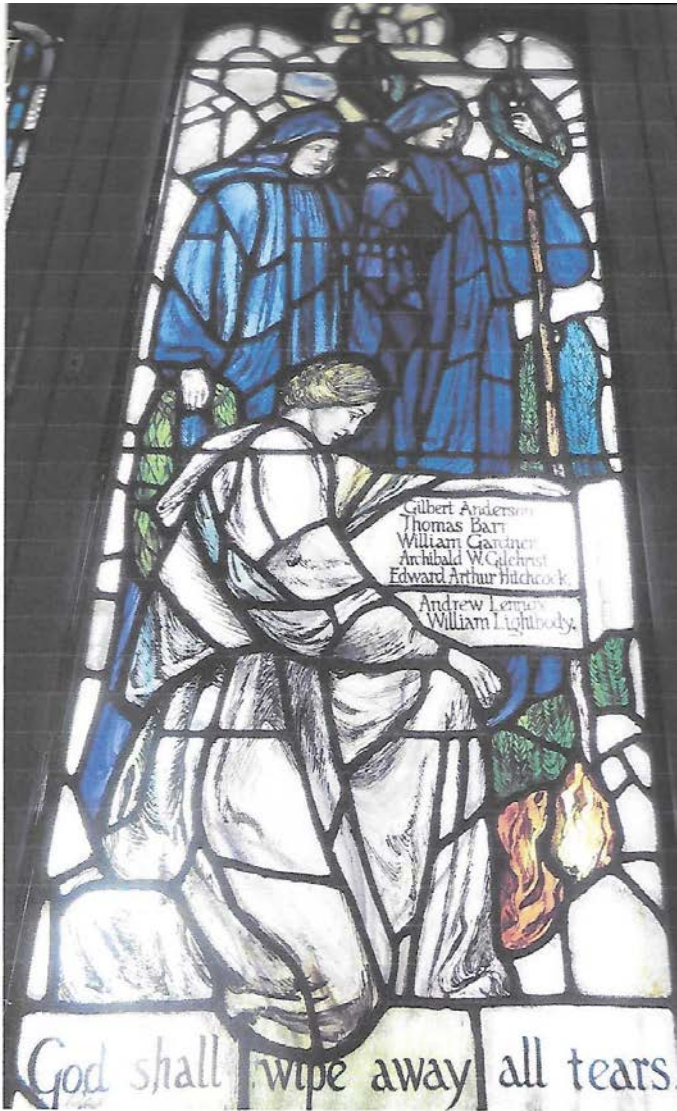
The fourth shows David defeating Goliath

"Through God we shall do valiantly" ;

And the last Dorcas, "Full of good works".

In the centre window is shown the Spirit of one who has given his life, supported by angels and clothed in a white robe, at his feet are laid his khaki clothes, helmet etc and Saint Andrews Banner.

The Dedication is written at the foot of the middle window. "To the glory of God" and in proud and loving memory of these men of ours who fell in the Great War 1914-1919.



On the left are three women standing with bowed heads, they hold staves on which are hung laurel wreaths: kneeling is a fourth figure in gray draperies, holding a scroll containing names of seven of the soldiers who fell:

Gilbert Anderson. Thomas Barr. William Gardner.
Arch. W. Gilchrist. Edward Arthur Hitchcock.
Andrew Lennox. William Lightbody.

A frame signifying Love is at the foot and cypress foliage is shown in the background.

This group represent grief and underneath is written, God shall wipe away all tears, Revelation chapter 7 verse 17.



On the right hand is another group of women, robed in brighter colours. This illustrates 'thanksgiving'. The three standing figures are singing and their staves now have golden wreaths. A kneeling figure in yellow, supports a scroll on which are the names of the remaining soldiers who fell:

Thomas Mason, Thomas McCulloch,
James McGeorge, Richard O.S. McKenzie,
David P. Nevison, James Robertson, James Wright.

Underneath is written "Their names liveth for evermore."
